In a world where entertainment is a big part of everyday life, reality TV has gained in popularity in recent years. Whether you enjoy binge-watching *Keeping up With the Kardashians* or your Monday nights are dedicated to *The Bachelor(ette)*, you probably have some experience with reality TV yourself. At this point in time, it's almost impossible to be able to say that you are completely unfamiliar with reality TV. But is reality TV really real? Are your favorite reality stars truly as dramatic as they appear to be on the show, or have they been told the best ways to make their show more appealing to viewers? Every reality show has a different level of "realness". It may be surprising to find out which shows are quite authentic, and which shows are completely scripted for entertainment purposes. THE CUOMO NURSING HOME COVER UP BY ARNAV KHANNA

Since the early days of the pandemic, the Governor of New York Andrew Cuomo (D) has been repeatedly criticized by many Republicans for his controversial decision on March 25, 2020, to send recovering COVID patients into nursing homes at the height of the pandemic. The decision reportedly contributed to the death of over 6,000 nursing home patientsor so we thought. On January 28, the state attorney general, Letitia James, issued a report alleging that the New York Department of Health undercounted the number of people who died in nursing homes by upwards of 50%. New recounts show that the actual number of people who died from nursing homes is 15,000, thus confirming the reports finding. Over the past two weeks, plenty of scathing information relating to this scandal has been uncovered. Specifically, this new information seems to confirm that Andrew Cuomo willingly withheld information on nursing home deaths to avoid investigations by the federal government. For example, New York state assemblyman Ron Kim, a fellow Democrat, said that Cuomo called him multiple times and urged him to lie about the cover-up or else he would be destroyed and ruined. In an interview with MSNBC, Kim said this: "Gov. Cuomo called me the next day at 8 p.m., while

I was about to bathe my kids — I was with my wife. And for 10 minutes he berated me, he yelled at me, he told me that my career would be over, he's been biting his tongue for months against me, and I had tonight — not tomorrow — tonight to issue a new statement, essentially asking me to lie." Bill de Blasio, the Mayor of NYC and another fellow Democrat, said that he wasn't surprised by the bullying allegations, calling them "Classic Andrew Cuomo". He went on to say that he knew plenty of other people who have had similar bullying-like interactions with Governor Cuomo.

As grave as the accusations from Ron Kim is, there is still more evidence that is equally as damaging to the Governor. Secretary to the Governor admitted in a private phone call to lawmakers that the numbers were doctored to shield a federal investigation from the former Trump administration. This shocking admission is essentially a smoking gun to the year-long nursing home scandal.



Instead, he blamed Republican state congressmen, the Trump administration, and other lies and misinformation. The closest thing he did to apologizing was admitting that there was a void in information. What he should have done was own up to the void in his leadership. Due to the plethora of evidence against him, even the radical left Alexandria Ocasio Cortez has demanded an investigation into the nursing home scandal.

What makes this scandal all the more damaging and somewhat embarrassing is that Cuomo was portrayed as a COVID hero by the media. Many networks praised him for his "outstanding leadership" and "bravery". Not to mention, Cuomo won an Emmy for his "Masterful Covid Briefings" a couple of months ago. Perhaps worst of all, Cuomo ended up writing a book on leadership lessons he learned during the Covid Crisis, thus profiting off of all those who died as a result of the policies that he instituted. In short, this scandal runs contrary to the "heroic leader" type character that the media portrayed him as, and this runs contrary to what

Cuomo portrayed himself as when the cameras were rolling.

Andrew Cuomo is currently being investigated by the FBI and the U.S attorneys in Brooklyn. He also faces the ever-growing threat of impeachment. All we can do is hope that justice is served to Andrew Cuomo, the now-disgraced governor.






Many Americans are beginning to question the Governor's decisions during the crisis and are questioning why the media failed to cover the the story that has been known since April.
